Minister of Land Reform:

That this Assembly –

Agrees to the Ratification of the African Union Convention on Border Co-operation (Naimey Convention).

NOTICE OF A MOTION:

Mr. Venaani:

That this Assembly –

- (i) *Discusses* value addition on all our extractive industries, more so the mining sector as means to stimulate unemployment and high foreign earnings.

African countries have exported basic raw materials, missing out on opportunities to turn basic ingredients into finished goods that can earn them more income.

Value addition is not economically exploited in Africa, making it difficult for the continent to grow. Namibia needs to invest in industrialization to create jobs as well as increase the foreign exchange.

Africa and indeed Namibia relies majorly on exporting its raw materials only to buy them back in the form of finished products.

- (ii) *Debates* the need to put a curb of 30% of products to be put through value addition.
- (iii) That this Motion be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee for further input.
