**NOTICES OF MOTIONS**

**I. Mr. Smit:**

That in support of the fight against corruption:

That this Assembly –

*Discuss* the absence of an asset register at many Government entities and the financial and economic implications thereof.

**II. Mr. Venaani:**

That this Assembly –

*Debate* the precarious situation unfolding in Zimbabwe.

- (a) There has of late been a renewed arbitrary crackdown on opposition activists, members of civil society and journalists by the government of Zimbabwe.
- (b) Dozens if not hundreds of lives have been lost through this state sponsored violence. Among those killed include prominent opposition members Mazwi Ndlovu and Lavendar Chiwaya.
- (c) We cannot sit back and watch this travesty of justice unfold against the people of Zimbabwe. The time has come for the Namibian Government to set aside any liberation movement camaraderie it has with ZANU-PF, and condemn the state sponsored violence with the full comprehension it deserves. Even the ANC has condemn the state sponsored violence in Zimbabwe.

- (d) Let me remind this august House that if Zimbabwe explodes, the economic and humanitarian crisis will be felt throughout the whole SADC Region. Hence, we have a collective responsibility to address and find a long-lasting solution to the situation in Zimbabwe.

**III. Mr. Venaani:**

That this Assembly –

*Debate* the need to promulgate the Flexible Land Tenure Act 4 of 2012.

The importance of the Act is in place to look at plans on how the less fortunate and previously disadvantaged Namibians will have access to a piece of land/plot where they can build their own places to call a home.

Challenges motivating this discussions of this Act arises at the fact that most Namibians do not own land. Majority of the spaces of land is occupied by the rich, the fortunate and business entities.

For over 25 years, we have thousands of Namibians living and erecting shacks in the informal settlements on the land that still do not belong to them as we speak. The Act should make provisions to these ordinary Namibians that such pieces of land should be on their names as sole ownership.

I would like this House to discuss and make necessary intervention, inter alia, also look at how the shack dwellers federation can be given enough free ervens in order to build affordable houses faster for the populace.

**IV. Mr. Smit:**

That this Assembly –

*Debate* the issue of the responsibility of Accounting Officers in all Government Ministries, Offices and Agencies, and regional and local authorities since there are so many of these organisations whose audits are qualified by the Auditor General every year. Nothing is done about this, there is zero responsibility on the part of the Accounting Officers or the Executive Directors, and the same pattern is repeated every year without recourse or remedy.

**V. Minister of Health and Social Services:**

That this Assembly –

*Discuss and agree* to the Ratification of the Treaty for the Establishment of the African Medicines Agency.

That this Assembly –

*Discuss and debate* the plight of “Street kids” for more safe houses and places of safety.

That this Motion be referred to the relevant Parliamentary Standing Committee for further interrogation.

That this Assembly –

*Discuss and design* fair and effective approach for street vendors’ operation.
